Abstract

The Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) program in Family Science provides an interdisciplinary, research-oriented approach to the discovery and application of knowledge about families and health. The program examines both internal family processes and the dynamic interaction of families with the biological, psychological, social, political, and economic aspects of their environment. The program of study provides doctoral students with a broad knowledge of family theory, multiple research methodologies, family policy, family programs, racial/ethnic minority families, and major issues confronting contemporary families. Students also learn to design and implement culturally responsive interventions addressing family needs, to design and perform culturally relevant program evaluations, and to analyze the consequences of public/private policies on family health and well-being.

The Department of Family Science prepares students to describe, explain, and improve the quality of family life and health through applied research, education, therapy, human services, policy analysis, and advocacy. The approach is interdisciplinary, emphasizing individual, interpersonal, and social change. The program of study is based on a system or ecological paradigm, combining the perspectives of interrelated professional fields including family science, couple and family therapy, family health, family policy, behavioral science, and human services. Graduates are prepared for careers in the public, non-profit and private sectors, including university teaching, research, family policy analysis, and administrative positions in human service and public health programs.

Students applying to the PhD program in Family Science should have a Master's degree in Family Science or a related behavioral or social science.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

- Bachelor's degree
- Minimum 3.0 undergraduate GPA
- Transcripts from all previous coursework
- English proficiency test score (TOEFL, IELTS or PTE) (international applicants (<https://gradschool.umd.edu/admissions/english-language-proficiency-requirements/>))
- Statement of purpose and objectives, including career and educational goals, professional experience, areas of interest, and faculty you are interested in working with
- Response to personal experiences question(s)

PROGRAM-SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

- Master's degree in a relevant field
- Letters of Recommendation (3)
- CV/Resume
- One writing sample is required. Examples of writing samples include published manuscripts, undergraduate or graduate theses, research papers, etc. If you submit a published manuscript and you are not the first author, describe the contributions you made to the publication
- Supplemental Application (<https://gradschool.umd.edu/public-health/fmsc/>) (required):
 - Please provide a personal statement (1 page) addressing the following: (1) how your personal and professional experiences contribute to the social, intellectual, or cultural diversity within a campus community and the discipline and (2) any past experiences with advancing social justice as well as your vision for how your scholarship will contribute to advancing social justice in the discipline
 - Upload the statement using the specific form (linked above)
- GRE scores are **not required** for this program and won't be reviewed
- Applicants being considered for the program will be invited for an interview

Note for applicants with foreign credentials:
